8th Grade English – 22-23 Curriculum Framework Document

This framework is designed to provide teacher flexibility and discretion in texts, support, and scaffolding, while also providing district-wide common writing assessments. **This is not a complete curriculum**, and we expect supplemental materials will be added at the site or classroom level.

Text choices and culminating assessments are flexible IN TOPIC to allow for teacher and site discretion; however, assessment types/skills should be universal across the district. The first semester assessments include an informative/explanatory analysis essay and a narrative sequential essay. Second semester includes an argumentative research essay with an alternative or opposing claim and an informative/explanatory descriptive discussion. Teachers are expected to use common assessment tasks. Common Assessments may be collaboratively assessed at the district level.
