Learning Competency Focus: Collaboration & UDL

This month we are focusing on **Collaboration** and **UDL**. We often use the term *collaboration* to describe the simple act of working with others. True collaboration, however, requires more than individuals working together; it must also have a clear purpose. Thus,

WORKING TOGETHER + PURPOSE = COLLABORATION

In reviewing the definition of collaboration ...we see that *working together* occurs in "pairs or groups," and that *purpose* is defined as "discussing an issue, solving a problem, or creating a product."

Universal Design for Learning (UDL) is a set of principles for <u>curriculum</u> development that give all individuals equal opportunities to learn. UDL provides a blueprint for creating instructional goals, methods, materials, and assessments that work for every-one--not a single, one-size-fits-all solution, but rather flexible approaches that can be customized and adjusted for individual needs. Providing access for all students is key.

Having students experience true 21st Century Collaboration during classroom activities allows all students to access the academic information and gives all students equal opportunities to learn.

Can you just give a short background of yourself, what you teach and when you first started using the 21st Century Learning Practices?

My name is Julie Thomas and I am currently a 5th grade ELA/Social Studies teacher at Agnes Riley Elementary. I am a fairly new teacher of five years and quickly grew a passion for 21st Century Learning courses, as the content and strategies were relevant to my students

and I was able to transfer my learning into my classroom immediately. My first 21st Century course was Camp 21 in the Fall of 2013. The success I encountered in that course encouraged me to enroll in both Camp 21 and the Becoming a 21st Century Educator-Practitioner courses in the Fall of 2014. I then had the opportunity to cofacilitate the Practitioner Badge course with Terra Graves, as well as, facilitate the Becoming a 21st Century Educator: Explorer Badge course in 2015. While working on my Masters in Administration from 2015-April 2017, I took a break from district courses, but I am utilizing the skills I developed over the years and am looking forward to engaging in more courses in the near future.

my instruction so that learning is student-centered and students are continuously engaging in meaningful learning experiences.

How has implementing the 21st-century learning practices transformed your students' learning and their achievement?

Implementing the 21st Century Learning practices has made my students aware of how they are learning. By the end of the year, my students have a solid understanding of the 21st Century Competencies and how those developed skills assist them in their academic and personal growth. At the beginning of a school year, students tend to be quite reserved and dependent upon me, but after training students in these valuable 21st Century skills, my classroom is transformed into a community of learning where students are leading the conversations in a lesson, constructing their own learning paths, problem-solving through collaboration and communication, and understanding how to utilize technology to drive their learning; all of these skills that will assist them through college and career.

In thinking about planning with, and implementing, the 21st-century learning practices, what advice would you give to someone who is new to 21st Century Learning?

When I first began planning for 21st Century Learning practices, I always had the 21st Century Competencies Guide next to me so that I could be purposeful in my planning. Just start simple. Look at a lesson that you have previously taught and that you will teach again. Choose one 21st Century dimension on the 21st Century Competencies Guide and determine where that lesson falls. Now, make just one adjustment or addition that will move your lesson up on the guide and strengthen the learning of your students. Also, you may want to start by choosing just one 21st Century dimension to focus on each quarter, making the transition more manageable for both you and your students. Remember, every lesson does not need to be at the top of each dimension. Finally, don't be afraid to try new strategies and to move outside of your comfort zone as an educator, as much success and growth can come from being uncomfortable.

Highlights from Ms. Thomas' 5th Grade Classroom

This was a Round Robin Vocabulary activity in which students were given academic words without the definitions. They had 3 minutes to answer a question using the word through discussions in their groups, then 3 minutes to independently record their answers to a second question utilizing the vocabulary words. The students were constructing the meaning of the words through interactions with those words. After students had experienced all 6 words, we shared some of their written responses and the students developed definitions for each word. This is such a powerful lesson!

When we engage in activities, I am training my students to use the Elevator Guide to understand how they are learning. We discuss the aspects of each activity and students determine where it falls on the guide. We also discuss how the activity could be enhanced to climb a step further and push their learning to
