Community

Washoe County School District serves the educational needs of the greater Washoe County, Nevada. Washoe County encompasses the Reno area and extends as far north as Wadsworth, Nevada, south to Washoe Valley, and west to Lake Tahoe, where Incline Village is located. Incline Village is unique in that it is a rural mountain community with a population of approximately 9,000 people and is separated from the other Washoe County Schools by a mountain pass. Currently, the Washoe County School District consists of 16 high schools, 16 middle schools and 65 elementary schools utilizing a K–5, 6–8, 9–12 grade-level configuration. Washoe County has one on-line K-12 school.

Incline High School

Incline Village, Nevada, has one comprehensive high school. Incline High School is a four-year public high school enrolling 319 students in grades 9–12. The school opened in the fall of 1968 and graduated its first senior class in the spring of 1969. Incline High was accredited by **AdvancED** in 2016. Incline's 2018-2019 Accountability Report demographic information reports 54% White, 40% Hispanic, 4% Multiracial, and 2% Asian.

Curriculum

The academic program is organized on an A/B block, two semester schedule. The minimum course load for students until senior year is seven classes. All core classes are year-long and most of our elective classes run on a half year schedule. Within a standard schedule, students take six 100-minute block classes and one 50-minute class. The 50-minute class is designed to enrich students in college and post high school skills or is a support class for students' classes and/or skill attainment. Students attend three 100-minute block classes and the 50-minute class daily. Each block class meets every other day on an A/B rotation. Within a standard schedule, student will earn up to 7 credits per year.

Dual Credit

Students can earn college credits at regional higher educational institutions: Sierra Nevada University, Truckee Meadows Community College, the University of Nevada, Reno and Western Nevada College.

J.R.O.T.C

The focus of Army JROTC is reflected in its mission, "To motivate young people to be better citizens." Four semesters of JROTC fulfill the Nevada PE graduation requirement. A fifth semester of JROTC will satisfy health credit, a sixth semester will fulfill .5 credits of Arts and Humanities/ Career Technology Education (CTE), a seventh semester will fulfill both an additional .5 credits of Arts and Humanities/ Career Technology Education (CTE) and a .5 honors credit, and an eight semester provides an additional .5 honors credit.

Diplomas

Standard Diploma: Completed a minimum of 22.5 credits with all requirements met and have taken the College and Career Readiness assessment and the civics examination prescribed by the State.

Advanced Diploma: Completed a minimum of 24 credits, including all requirements for a standard diploma plus one additional credit of science (total 3 credits) and one additional credit of math (total 4 credits) with a minimum of 3.25 cumulative GPA, and will have taken the College and Career Readiness assessment prescribed by the State.

College & Career Ready Diploma: Completed a minimum of 24 credits for an Advanced Diploma and demonstrated the following:

1. Proficiency in speaking not less than 2 languages or have earned not less than two credits in one or more of the areas below:

Advanced Placement courses; or International Baccalaureate courses; or Dual credit courses; or Career and Technical Education courses; or Work-based Learning or Internship courses; or World Language courses

2. Earned one or both endorsements:

a. College Ready Endorsement – This endorsement will be awarded to graduates who successfully complete the college readiness assessment prescribed by the Board of Regents of the University of Nevada and receive not less than the minimum scores for initial placement into college-level English and mathematics courses prescribed by the Board of Regents of the University of Nevada.

b. Career Ready Endorsement – This endorsement will be awarded to graduates who successfully complete a career readiness assessment, complete a CTE program of study and the Nevada Skills Certificate or obtain an industry recognized credential.

3. Taken the College and Career Readiness assessment and the civics examination prescribed by the State as a diploma requirement for their respective graduating class.

Honors Diploma: This student will have:

Completed a minimum of 24 credits (20 required and 4 elective) including at least eight (8) qualified honors level classes, Algebra 2, at least courses taken in high school in biology, physics and/or chemistry and two (2) credits in the same world language. Earned a minimum 3.40 cumulative GPA, weighted (no rounding), with no course failures during the last two years, unless the course is repeated to remove the "F" from the transcript. Taken the College and Career Readiness assessment and the civics examination prescribed by the State as a diploma requirement for their respective graduating class. This diploma is designed to reward students who take and succeed in the most challenging academic program that the high school has to offer.

Seals, Certificates, and Endorsements

Seals

Nevada Career & Technical Education Endorsement/Seal: Students must satisfy the requirements for graduation from high school and successfully complete an approved sequence of courses within a career and technical education program area.

Nevada State Seal of Biliteracy: High school graduates who have demonstrated proficiency in English and one or more world languages.

Nevada State Seal of STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics): High school graduates must earn a 3.25 grade point average on a 4.0 scale or a 3.85 weighted grade point average, earn at least four credits in science, at least four credits in mathematics, and at least one credit in computer science, engineering, manufacturing, electronics, or a career and technical education program of study in information and media technologies or skilled and technical science. Students must also demonstrate proficiency in science and mathematics by passing one of the qualifying assessments offered in WCSD.

Nevada State Seal of STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Mathematics): High school graduates must earn a 3.25 grade point Incline High School average on a 4.0 scale or a 3.85 weighted grade point average, earn at least three credits in science, at least four credits in mathematics, at least one credit in computer science, engineering, manufacturing, electronics, or a career and technical education program of study in information and media technologies or skilled and technical science and one credit in fine arts. In addition, students must demonstrate proficiency in science and mathematics by passing one of the qualifying assessments offered in WCSD.

AP Capstone:

Students who earn scores of 3 or higher in both AP Capstone courses and on four additional AP exams of their choosing will receive the AP Capstone Diploma. [™]

Grading and Ranking

A – Excellent	90–100% = 4.0

Grade Point Average (GPA) Calculation

GPA is computed in all subjects using the above quality points from grade nine. A minimum of 22.5 credits is **required for graduation. Honors classes are weighted by 0.025 and AP classes are weighted by 0.05 per semester.** Grades are recorded on the transcript, and GPA and ranking are computed in January and in June. We do calculate class rank.

Post High School Placement

There were 57 graduates in the Class of 2020

- 58% of graduates, matriculated to 4-year colleges
- 30% of graduates, matriculated to 2-year institutions or trade schools
- 12% of graduates, elected work, military service or service programs (as a Gap Year)

- In May 2020, 111 of Incline students took a total of 250 AP Exams
- 63% of the AP Exams taken received scores of 3 or higher
- 15 students achieved AP SCHOLAR status: 7 AP Scholars, 3 with honor, 5 with Distinction
- 4 AP Capstone Diplomas were awarded
