March 6, 2019

1. Opening Items

The meeting of the School Naming Committee was called to order at 5:35 p.m. in the WCSD Central Administration Building, 425 E. Ninth Street, Board Room, Reno, Nevada.

1.02 Roll Call

Committee Members Frank Perez, Renee Martin, Alyson Castro, Clyyne Cook, Carly Lott and Scott Benton were present at roll call. Victor Sherbondy, Mercedes de la Garza, Jennifer Hampton and Elizabeth Genasci were absent at roll call. Staff Liaison, Riley Sutton and WCSD Legal Counsel, Neil Rombardo were also present.

1.03 Public Comment

Jim Barkley brought up perceived issues with the Community Ranking Survey process.

1.04 Action to Adopt the Agenda

Motion from Carly Lott and second by Frank Perez to adopt the agenda. The result of the vote was unanimous: Pass (Yea: Carly Lott, Alyson Castro, Renee Martin, Clyyne Cook, Frank Perez and Scott Benton.) Final Resolution: Motion carried.

2.01 Discussion and Possible Approval of the Minutes from the February 6, 2019 Naming Committee meeting

Motion from Frank Perez and second by Carly Lott to approve the February meeting minutes. The result of the vote was unanimous: Pass (Yea: Carly Lott, Alyson Castro, Renee Martin, Clyyne Cook, Frank Perez and Scott Benton.) Final Resolution: Motion carried.

2.02 Discussion and Possible Action on Semi-Finalist Name Submissions For The New Middle School In Arrowcreek, the community responses to those semi-finalists, and the creation of a finalist list of no more than three names based on individual rankings of committee members to be recommended to the Board of Trustees

Committee Liaison, Riley Sutton, briefly explained to the committee the process for creating the finalist list.

2.02 Public Comment

Howard Herz, Chris Bender, Tamara McKinney, Jim Barkley, Lucius Kane, Bill Henderson, Todd Torvinen, Nancy O'Connell, and Don Thompson all spoke in favor of naming the new middle school in the Arrowcreek area after Marce Herz.

Tim Henderson spoke in favor of naming the new middle school in the Arrowcreek area after Sessions Wheeler.

Committee Discussion:

Staff Liaison, Riley Sutton, informed the committee that he had spoken with the Pyramid Lake Native American Tribe whom granted permission for the name Numu Middle School (replacing Paiute) to remain on the Semi-Finalist list. Legal Counsel, Neil Rombardo, approved this change.

Committee members discussed and then gave their individual point rankings for their top three finalists: three points for their top pick, two points for their second place pick, and one point for their third place pick. Mr. Sutton tallied points. The top three choices in order were Marce Herz, Ann Carlson and Arrowcreek Middle School. This was a non-binding point total allowing discussion from the committee.

Motion by Renee Martin, second by Frank Perez, to forward the names Marce Herz, Ann Carlson and Arrowcreek Middle School to a future meeting of the Board of Trustees for final consideration for the name of the new middle school in the Arrowcreek area. The result of the vote was unanimous: Pass (Yea: Carly Lott, Alyson Castro, Renee Martin, Clyyne Cook, Frank Perez and Scott Benton.)

-She was an exceptional student, and included in her records are three teaching certificates dating from 1894 to 1903.

-Vitaly interested in the welfare of women, Felice Cohn became involved in suffrage rights for women in 1911. She was one of the founding members of the State Equal Franchise Society and chaired the legislative committee during the 1911 legislative session, lobbying effectively during that time to see the successful passage of the resolution she had drafted: 'There shall be no denial of the elective franchise at any election on account of sex.' People were amazed at the ease with which the resolution was passed, due in part to her efforts. Though the resolution passed in 1911, there was still a lot of work to be done by many women before it would be passed in 1913 and placed on the Nevada ballot for final passage.

-She practiced in both Goldfield and Carson City. The Federal government employed Miss Cohn as assistant superintendent of public sales of land. She traveled all over Nevada, Montana, Colorado, and other western states in the performance of these duties. Working in this capacity, she recognized women and the work they were doing as public officials and as homesteaders. In May, 1908, she was admitted to the District Court of Appeals in San Francisco.

-Felice was very visible in Nevada and in Washington, D.C. In a national magazine called Leslie's Weekly in July 31, 1913, an article stated, 'and like the great majority of woman suffragists in this country, (Felice Cohn) does not believe in militant methods.' In 1916 Felice was involved in chartering a Non-Militant Equal Suffrage Society and the Nevada Voter's Club, both with members numbering in the hundreds. In February 1916, Felice went to Washington, D.C. to do some work related to land issues for the Department of Interior. She stayed, however, for a March ceremony where she was admitted to practice law before the Supreme Court, the fourth woman in the nation to be given that privilege. She was becoming well known in powerful political circles in both the East and the West. In 1918, Cohn was appointed as hearings attorney for the U.S. Land Office, again a first for a woman. In this capacity, she worked with several Western states in selling lands at auctions. She had supervision of the United States land grant sales in Oregon during the opening of the Oregon and California Railroad in 1918.

-Felice Cohn is a historic figure born and raised in Nevada. In 1922, Felice opened a law office in Reno and in 1926 was appointed U.S. Referee in Bankruptcy for the District of Nevada, an unsolicited honor, where she served three terms. During her terms she had an outstanding record of having her decisions reversed only twice.

-A substantial portion of Cohn's private law practice involved divorces, but she also worked with child labor issues, foster homes, adoption, and other legislative issues adversely affecting women and children. She was quite outspoken nationally about the divorce laws in Nevada and staunchly supported them. She said in a speech in New York, 'Nevada has been criticized for her divorce laws, but it is due almost entirely to the need of relief by the citizens of other states that we find ourselves the 'cure' center of the world.' They came to Nevada because the laws of their own states afforded no avenue of escape from an intolerable condition, brought about most often by incompatibility and nothing more.' At that time, different states had different divorce laws and one could be married in one state, become divorced/single in another, and be committing bigamy in a third. Her law offices were in the Mapes Building in Reno and her residence in Reno was at 118 West Street. Another substantial involvement for Felice was with the American Red Cross effort during the war. She was one of the founders of the Nevada Federation of Business and Professional Womens' Clubs, and its first President in 1929. She obtained a \$15,000 grant from the legislature to establish a permanent home for the Nevada Historical Society. She was active in the Nevada Federation of Women's Clubs, National

Association of Women Lawyers, the American Women's Voluntary Services, the Reno YWCA, and the Nevada and California Bar Association. She was also involved in the B'nai B'rith organization for many years and was certified as president of B'nai B'rith Nevada Auxiliary #9 on March 12, 1941. Felice Cohn died in Reno on May 24, 1961. The evidence shows that she was consistently involved in the legal profession as a persistent and quiet voice shaping and supporting issues to better the quality of life for women and children in Nevada. She demonstrated a certainty that women have a role in whatever fields of endeavor they wish to pursue and a belief that opportunities would only grow in the future.

-Quoting from the Nevada Women's Project, Debbie "began serving Nevada schools at the age of 22 when she was elected to Lander County School Board (1978-1980). After moving to Sparks, NV in 1981, she continued to support public education as president of the Nevada PTA and a member of the National PTA Board of Directors. Governors Bob Miller and Kenny Guinn appointed her to chair the

Council to Establish Academic Standards where she served 8 years and led the state process of developing its first academic standards. While in the Nevada Legislature, Debbie sponsored the School Works bill (WC-1) that 'gave WCSD more access to bond funding to rehabilitate older schools, thus freeing up construction funding for other projects.' She also sponsored a bill for full-day kindergarten in 2010. In 2013, she supported Brianna's Law requiring a DNA sample whenever a person is booked for a felony arrest, to help track down those suspected of sexual assault crimes. Another law that she helped pass required all schools to keep EpiPens in stock to counteract potentially lethal allergic reactions. She was very active in all WCSD schools, but especially Title 1. Debbie was the kind of Senator that would get down on the floor in her skirt and heels and play with the children (without the cameras). She truly dedicated her life to Nevada, Nevadans, and Nevada's children.

-Debbie's impact is still rippling throughout WCSD and Nevada. The EpiPen law allows a step to safety for all children with severe allergies (known or unknown). Access to bond funding has allowed WCSD to move forward with rehabilitating older schools, thus freeing up funding for construction of new schools and projects. Her impact in Sun Valley schools is still felt today, where children have safer access to education.

-While Debbie was an incredible Assemblywoman and Senator in Nevada, she also served children on the board of the Girl Scouts of Sierra Nevada, the Washoe County Education Alliance, advisory boards for the Northern Nevada's Children's Cancer Foundation, and the Nevada After School Alliance. She was also an autism advocate in 2011.

-Deborah June Bilbrey moved to Battle Mountain, NV in the 4th grade where she later graduated from Battle Mountain High School in 1974 and married Gregory Smith shortly after. Little did Nevada know the number of contributions this woman would make during her lifetime--contributions that are still rippling throughout our state.

Genasci, a former UNR quarterback, halfback, and wrestler, forged strong bonds with local businesses and the community. He served on a variety of community advisory boards relating to youth, and has successfully developed community support and involvement by leading fund-raising efforts for the school's athletic programs and helping to coordinate Harrah's adoption of Hug through the Partners in Education Program. An active member of several

professional organizations, Genasci served as president of the Nevada Association of School administrators and worked with the National Association of Secondary School Principals. He physically planted nearly all the trees surrounding Hug HS. Additionally, he took out a second mortgage on his home to finance lighting the football field so that the players could host the more popularly attended night games. Working with difficult teens, especially those whose backgrounds were highly dysfunctional and a high school diploma seemed unobtainable; Genasci had to be clear with his students and staff. His ethical behavior would be constantly under watch, and trust was of the utmost importance. Genasci helped coordinate Harrah's adoption of Hug through the Partners in Education Program.

-Throughout his career, Genasci's focus has always been leading children and people by understanding their needs, listening to their fears, and being their advocate through trust. Although retired, Genasci sees his role as a facilitator who empowered others to achieve and find their own greatness. He believes that greatness is found in the influence you have on others. He takes great pride in the young people he mentored that went on to do great things or be kind, active citizens. Prior to his administrative work in WCSD, Genasci was a psychologist in Placerville Schools, developed the Peace Corps selection and training program (70s), and as a school administrator in Kinshasa, Zaire, Africa. Tough love and listening were often given to students who received little of either from society and their family life. Genasci found himself blending his cross-cultural analysis tools with the leadership styles he had learned from being an athlete and a coach. He could empower students to do the right thing, by letting them have the choice. Genasci created the first 'secret witness' style program at Hug High School, which was implemented district wide for many years. 'Psychology teaches you how to listen. Listening is such a large part of leadership. Knowing when to talk and when to shut up.' (Genasci, 2014).

-Genasci listened and accepted his students, gained their trust, forgave them for their mistakes, and led them to better choices. He was able to help his students dream big—obtaining the first high school diploma in their family, graduating from college, and eventually running for office and become a leader in their community. Genasci was the first educator in Nevada to receive the Milken Foundation award for Outstanding Secondary School Administrator of the Year. He sees his success in programs that still exist, staff he mentored who are now international and/or community leaders, and at risk students who graduated college. Awards include Hall of Fame (Reno Gazette-Journal), Citizen of the Year (Sparks Chamber of Commerce), Outstanding Educator Proclamation (Governor of Nevada), Outstanding Secondary School Administrator (Milken Foundation), Outstanding Nevada Secondary Principal (State of Nevada), Public Administrator of the Year (Reno Magazine), Humanitarian of the Year (Reno Gazette-Journal), and Excellence in Education—Secondary School (U.S. Department of Education).

-There are defining moments in our lives where our leadership evolves and the successes come from empowering others to reach their potential. This has been Genasci's historical footprint on the people of Nevada, specifically the students and staff of WCSD.

-Genasci's family settled in Paradise Valley, NV and Sierra Valley, CA as cattle ranchers in the early 1880s. A graduate of UNR, he has lived in Washoe County steadily since the 1970s.

-As stated prior, Genasci developed a first-of-its-kind secret witness type program that was replicated throughout WCSD until the current program. He worked with business leaders to help fund at-risk schools. He financially helped install the first stadium lights at Hug HS, as well as planting numerous trees that now shade the grounds. Genasci contributed to leading his students and staff to be successful.

Debbie also worked for WCSD as a Parent Involvement Coordinator and built many new family engagement initiatives. She was a passionate and effective advocate for family engagement and this work alone qualifies her for recognition.Serving as a parent volunteer was just the first step for Debbie. She was also passionate about the quality of education. Governors Miller and Guinn appointed her to chair the Nevada Council to Establish Academic Standards where she served as chair for eight years.In 2000, Debbie directed her considerable energy and work ethic to the hard work of developing policy. She ran and was elected to serve in both the Nevada Assembly and Senate where it was no surprise that she focused much of her efforts on Education. Again, she rose through the ranks to serve in leadership roles in both houses including chair of the Assembly Ways and Means Committee and Assembly Speaker Pro Tempore as well as Chair of the Senate Finance Committee and Senate Assistant Majority Leader. And much like her other efforts, Debbie's leadership was recognized and she was selected as the first representative from Nevada to serve in leadership for the National Conference of State Legislators rising ultimately to serve as the President, bringing both the needs and accomplishments of Nevada to the national stage.In every one of Debbie's many leadership roles, first and foremost she was an advocate for education. And she didn't just collect leadership titles " she was incredibly effective.

-In her PTA and WCSD roles Debbie advocated for the importance of family engagement and built several initiatives to make schools more welcoming to parents and families and increase family involvement.In her Chair of the Nevada Council to Establish Academic Standards, Debbie led the development of the first set of Academic StandardsIn her roles in the Legislature, there are too many bills to list. Highlighting two, Debbie worked for three legislative sessions to identify a source of funding for capital projects for Washoe County Schools. Ultimately, she was successful in passing the legislation

that led to the creation of the WC-1 campaign. Without Senator Smith's efforts to pass this legislation the school district would not have the resources to build this new high school. Second, Debbie passed a bill that required school districts to stock Epi-Pens or their equivalent. This legislation is credited with saving the lives of multiple students. It should also be noted that in her roles as Chair of the powerful Assembly Ways and Means and Senate Finance Committee, Debbie was a fierce advocate for funding for education. Where we have been successful in increasing revenue for schools, Debbie has always been leading the way.

-As highlighted above, Debbie started her service as a local PTA volunteer and rose to serve as president of PTA Nevada and served on the Board of Directors of the National PTA. Similarly she started as a freshman representative of her Assembly District in Sparks and rose to leadership in both house of the Nevada Legislature. 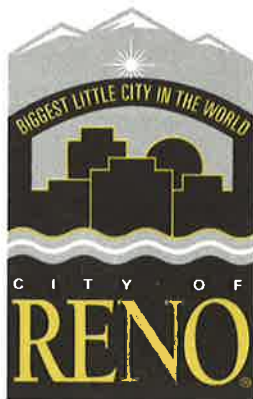

Dear Committee Members:

I write to express my support for your consideration of naming one of Washoe County's future schools after City of Reno first round, People Honoree, the late Dolores Feemster and her son, the late Darryl K. Feemster Sr., for demonstrating extraordinary leadership and personal dedication to the community over decades. Their memory as impactful leaders who served this community through various platforms, always with compassion, will be well served by naming a school in their honor.

Native, Dolores M. Feemster of 89 years, married and birthed 12 children, many reared into community leadership and service. One of those children was her son, Darryl K. Feemster Sr., a lifetime native of 55 years at the time of his death in November 2017. Mother and son, Dolores and Darryl had a profound influence on the community and were leaders in their own right.

Dolores M. Feemster, a bi-racial child born into a segregated Nevada is remembered as a soft-spoken activist who brought people together. In Reno's northeast community she is known as "Mother of All", and during her employment with Washoe County School district, "Mother Hug". She worked for Procter R. Hug high school for more than 30 years in administration, as a counselor and mentor who lead students to organize the first ever cultural heritage and diversity groups. Dolores advocated diversity training for Washoe County School District teachers, and diligently mentored students to graduate secondary school while serving as a resource to find opportunities for students to pursue higher education before she retired. Over her lifetime she founded community programs for youth and seniors, served on the boards of many organizations from Nevada Woman's Fund -1990, Hall of Fame recipient, National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, Northern NV – President and matriarch, President's Medal from the University of Nevada City of Reno, People Project 2017 as a first round honoree for her distinguished contributions to the 'Biggest Little City'. Dolores' personal home was a hub for community organizations, and families in the community if they needed a safe place to go - some escaping domestic violence, if they were in need of food for their family, and some came following athletic events were players would gather in camaraderie around her homecooked meal. Dolores Feemster has dedicated immeasurable time to the community. She reared her children the same.

Darryl K. Feemster Sr., son of Dolores M. Feemster, became a compassionate friend of the community at an early age. Seeing the need for youth in the area to have a safe place to go after school, he advocated for Traner Middle School to be used as an after-school recreation facility. Darryl continued to develop his relations with the northeast Reno community during his employment with the Boys and Girls Club of Truckee Meadows. Darryl was an advocate to establish the Duncan/Traner library and was pivotal in the dissolution to close the

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facility 20 years later in 2015. Though Darryl worked for the General Motors corporation for many years, his passion was helping people find solutions to domestic challenges by connect resources and information through community programs and education that would lead to bettering the community he grew up in and loved. Follow his employment with General Motors Darryl reignited his focus on his community. He became a City of Reno Councilman for a short term and found a more effective fit to contribute to his vision by working directly in the community as Director of Glenn Duncan Elementary School's Family Focus Center. Darryl was known for locating resources for families and their children. He became known and dignified as a resourceful giant; "Darryl, The Giant". He later became, City youth/senior parks manager Darryl Feemster Sr.as the City Youth/Senior Parks Manager. Outside of his professional role, Darryl would network people in the community to the domestic or educational resources needed. Darryl served on the Reno-Sparks NAACP Executive Committee, Guinn Center – Community Policing for Northern Nevada – task force member, City of Reno Arts and Culturc Commission, City of Reno Senior Citizens committees and there are many more to name and lists of family's he's helped. Darryl served his family, the community as his extended family and in his professional role honorably. His devotion to people in his community has been invaluable.

Dolores M. Feemster and Darryl K. Feemster Sr. - it is only fitting that an educational institution be named after them as an enduring testament of our gratitude for their dedication and sacrifice.
