Washoe County School District School Naming Committee Meeting Minutes

October 2, 2019

1. Opening Items

1.01 Call to Order

The meeting of the School Naming Committee was called to order at 5:32 p.m. in the WCSD Central Administration Building, 425 E. Ninth Street, Board Room, Reno, Nevada.

1.02 Roll Call

Committee Members Victor Sherbondy, Lisa Loader, Carly Lott, Marianne Coduti, Renee Martin, Clyyne Cook, Christiana Frank, Frank Perez, Scott Benton and Alejandro Mejia were all present. Alyson Castro was absent. Staff Liaison Riley Sutton was also present.

1.03 Public Comment

Ellen Minetto, WCSD Trustee, spoke to thank the committee members for what they do.

2. Items for Discussion, Presentation and/or Action

2.01 Action to Adopt the Agenda

Motion from Victor Sherbondy, second by Carly Lott to adopt the agenda. Motion carried unanimously.

2.02 Introduction of Committee Members

The School Naming Committee has four new members for the 2019-20 committee year. Lisa Loader, Marianne Coduti, Christiana Frank, and Alejandro Mejia introduced themselves to the committee.

The other members on the committee then introduced themselves as well.

2.03 Discussion and Possible Action to Select a Committee Chair for a term ending June 30, 2020 from the current membership: Scott Benton, Victor Sherbondy, Carly Lott, Alyson Castro, Clyyne Cook, Frank Perez, Renee Martin, Lisa Loader, Marianne Coduti, Christiana Frank, and Alejandro Mejia.

Staff Liaison Riley Sutton asked that WCSD Policy Coordinator Lisa Scurry lead the group through the process. Lisa Scurry followed up with a few specifics regarding committee chair nominations.

Clyyne Cook, the current vice-chair, asked the committee members if anyone had a nomination for committee chair.

Frank Perez nominated Clyyne Cook for chair. Frank Perez commented that, with several years of experience and having gone through this process with 3-5 different schools already, Clyyne Cook deserves the vote of chair.

No public comment was made.

Motion by Frank Perez, second by Scott Benton to elect Clyyne Cook. Motion carried unanimously. Clyyne Cook assumed the role of chair.

2.04 Discussion and Possible Action to Select a Committee Vice-Chair for a term ending June 30, 2020 from the current membership: Scott Benton, Victor Sherbondy, Carly Lott, Alyson Castro, Clyyne Cook, Frank Perez, Renee Martin, Lisa Loader, Marianne Coduti, Christiana Frank, and Alejandro Mejia.

Chair Cook asked the committee members if anyone had any specific committee vicechair nominations.

Marianne Coduti expressed an interest in being vice chair.

Motion by Carly Lott to elect Marianne Coduti to be the committee vice-chair, second by Scott Benton. The committee voted and the motion carried unanimously. Marianne Coduti was elected as the new committee vice-chair effective immediately.

2.05 Discussion and Possible Action to Approve the Minutes of the March 6, 2019 School Naming Committee meeting

Motion by Carly Lott, second by Victor Sherbondy to approve the meeting minutes from the March 6, 2019 School Naming Committee meeting. Motion carried unanimously.

2.06 Presentation and Discussion of the Washoe County School District's Plans for New School Construction and Other Capital Projects

Mr. Sutton informed the committee of the upcoming naming projects that they will be working on: the naming of the new high school in the Wildcreek area, the possible renaming of the current Hug High School campus, and an elementary school in Cold Springs.

2.07 Discussion and Possible Action to create a list of names that will be considered automatic semi-finalists for future schools from the unused finalists for previous schools: Arrowcreek, Ann Carlson, Debbie Smith, Sessions Wheeler, Michael Landsberry, and Sun Valley

Mr. Sutton discussed how in the past, three finalist names would be submitted to the Board of Trustees for vote – the two names not selected from that list would automatically roll over for future consideration. As a directive from the WCSD Board of Trustees, the regulation has since changed and the School Naming Committee members will now be responsible creating and curating a permanent rollover list of semi-finalists.

Mr. Sutton also stated that Ann Carlson had requested in writing that her name not be considered for any of the school names that will be voted on this Fall.

Scott Benton sought clarification that if the committee chooses to remove a name from the list tonight that the name can be added again to a future list. Mr. Sutton confirmed that this would be permitted.

Carly Lott suggested that this be an agenda item in all future meetings.

Frank Perez suggested that Arrowcreek, Ann Carlson, and Sun Valley be taken off the list for this round.

Motion by Scott Benton, second by Frank Perez, that the School Naming Committee select the following names of past finalists to be considered for automatic semi-finalists for future schools: Debbie Smith, Sessions Wheeler and Michael Landsberry. Motion passed unanimously.

2.07 Public Comment

Julia Ratti spoke in favor of Debbie Smith for the new high school in the Wildcreek area.

2.08 Discussion and Possible Action on Community Name Submissions for the New High School in the Wildcreek area and the future Career and Technical Education (CTE) campus at the existing Hug High School campus, the committee members' individual ranking of those submissions, and the creation of a semi-finalist list of no more than 10 names for each campus based on the individual rankings of the committee members to be considered at a future meeting for recommendation to the Board of Trustees

Mr. Sutton explained to the committee how the process of naming a school takes place.

Mr. Sutton stated that the goal for the meeting was to create a short list of no more than 10 semi-finalists, where each option would have a name for each school, taken from the community input submissions. At the next meeting on November 6, the committee would narrow the semi-finalist list down to three finalists for transmission to the Board of Trustees. The Board is tentatively scheduled to pick the final names at its meeting on November 12.

Mr. Sutton explained that the committee would listen to public comments and engage in conversation to discuss each committee member's top choices. The members would then rank the group's consensus picks based on the criteria provided and lastly total the rankings (point totals are non-binding) before moving forward with a motion and second.

2.08 Public Comment

Julia Ratti spoke in support of Debbie Smith for the new high school in the Wildcreek area.

Kenneth Dalton spoke in support of Dolores and/or Darryl Feemster for either the new high school or the CTE campus.

Bill Henderson spoke in support of Sessions Wheeler for the new high school.

Adrienne Feemster spoke in support of Dolores Feemster and/or Darryl Feemster for either the new high school at Wildcreek or the CTE campus.

Name not provided - spoke in support of the Feemster family.

2.08 Continued

Committee members each individually gave their suggestions for semi-finalist names, based on personal preference and public comment. Committee members took a 15-minute break then gave their individual score totals (from scores in each of the

individual categories) for each of these top names. Mr. Sutton totaled those complete committee scores.

Mr. Sutton confirmed that once this semi-finalist list is voted on, the list will go back out to the community for vote in this paired fashion.

Motion by Scott Benton to move forward with the top 10 selections from the list. Second by Victor Sherbondy.

More committee discussion took place regarding the top 10 as determined by the total ranking sheet.

Scott Benton tried to amend the original motion but did not receive a second, so the committee then voted to move forward with the top ten (refer to name scoring document at the end of minutes). Vote failed 5 to 5 (Yea: Victor Sherbondy, Lisa Loader, Clyyne Cook, Christiana Frank and Scott Benton. Nay: Carly Lott, Marianne Coduti, Renee Martin, Alejandro Mejia and Frank Perez).

Motion by Carly Lott to move forward with names from the top 11 picks, minus #2 (refer to name scoring document at the end of minutes) second by Renee Martin. Vote passed 6 to 4 (Yea: Lisa Loader, Carly Lott, Marianne Coduti, Renee Martin, Alejandro Mejia, and Frank Perez. Nay: Victor Sherbondy, Clyyne Cook, Christiana Frank and Scott Benton).

Motion by Carly Lott to create a semi-finalist list for the name of the new high school in the Wildcreek area as well as for the new CTE Campus consisting of the following names combinations respectively: Hug/Feemster, Hug/Debbie Smith, Debbie Smith/Hug, Hug/Sessions Wheeler, Dolores Feemster/Hug, Hug/Landsberry, Hug/Battleborn, Feemster/Hug, Battleborn/Hug and Hug/Paul Dugan. Motion carried unanimously.



I have followed the process regarding selecting names for the new high school at Wildcreek as well as for Hug High School and offer the following comments. I attempted to respond to the Reno Gazette Journal article but there was no vehicle in place to accept a comment.

A precedent has been set following a ruling that states newly constructed Washoe County high schools built in recognized geographical or geological areas are to bear the area's name. Although I understand this was modified recently, Wildcreek established in 1978 as a Sparks neighborhood park, still qualifies as a well-known geographical area. Surrounding businesses including the Wildcreek Business Park, medical practices, apartment complexes and housing developments have adopted the name Wildcreek. The creek that runs through the property off the Orr ditch is Wildcreek, a century old geographical landmark shown on topo maps.

Additionally, Washoe County Park By-Laws state parks are not to be renamed. Therefore, if the name selection follows policy, the area would remain as Wildcreek and the new high school that is located in Wildcreek (Park) should be appropriately named Wildcreek High School.

I understand the passion for naming a school after a person who has dedicated his/her career to education or is recognized for what he/she has accomplished for the betterment of education in our community. This is totally appropriate and is a long-standing tradition for new elementary and middle schools. However, the School Board of Trustees should adhere to the naming process and in this case Park By-Laws when selecting the name for the new high school. The new high school should be named Wildcreek High School.

By-Laws also state that once a high school is named, the name cannot be changed. This would be applicable to Hug High School. Since the school will take on a new curriculum focus, it still can be appropriately coupled with the Hug name. Hug CTE Academy.

There are many reasons supporting keeping the name Wildcreek that include regional support, inter school involvement and name recognition. I strongly urge the School Naming Committee and the School Board of Trustees to finalize the name Wildcreek High School.

I have followed the process regarding selecting names for the new high school at Wildcreek as well as for Hug High School and offer the following comments. I attempted to respond to the Reno Gazette Journal article but there was no vehicle in place to accept a comment.

A precedent has been set following a ruling that states newly constructed Washoe County high schools built in recognized geographical or geological areas are to bear the area's name. Although I understand this was modified recently, Wildcreek established in 1978 as a Sparks neighborhood park, still qualifies as a well-known geographical area. Surrounding businesses including the Wildcreek Business Park, medical practices, apartment complexes and housing developments have adopted the name Wildcreek. The creek that runs through the property off the Orr ditch is Wildcreek, a century old geographical landmark shown on topo maps.

Additionally, Washoe County Park By-Laws state parks are not to be renamed. Therefore, if the name selection follows policy, the area would remain as Wildcreek and the new high school that is located in Wildcreek (Park) should be appropriately named Wildcreek High School.

I understand the passion for naming a school after a person who has dedicated his/her career to education or is recognized for what he/she has accomplished for the betterment of education in our community. This is totally appropriate and is a long-standing tradition for new elementary and middle schools. However, the School Board of Trustees should adhere to the naming process and in this case Park By-Laws when selecting the name for the new high school. The new high school should be named Wildcreek High School.

By-Laws also state that once a high school is named, the name cannot be changed. This would be applicable to Hug High School. Since the school will take on a new curriculum focus, it still can be appropriately coupled with the Hug name. Hug CTE Academy.

There are many reasons supporting keeping the name Wildcreek that include regional support, inter school involvement and name recognition. I strongly urge the School Naming Committee and the School Board of Trustees to finalize the name Wildcreek High School.

Dear Trustees:

My name is Dan Klaich. I am a lifelong resident of Reno, and a product of the great schools in the Washoe County School District. I also have been involved in our community, primarily as an education advocate, and one-time elected official. I know how tough your job is, and I know how seriously you take it. Frankly, I seldom feel that it is important to write because of my enormous respect for you and faith in your decision-making. Thank you for your service.

However, while I don't feel any need to write at this time, I very much want to write to you. The subject is the naming of the new Wildcreek sited high school in Sparks.

What a wonderful list of folks you have to choose from! Like so many in our community, I worked on numerous projects related to education with Debbie Smith. Buck Wheeler was my high school biology teacher and instilled a love of Nevada and its wildlife in me. And who hasn't known and worked with the Feemster family, so many of whom have served this community in so many important ways?

Having said that – and I hope this does not come across as presumptuous – but I don't think you have to search and choose among that list. You already have named the high school in honor of Procter R. Hug, one of the most distinguished citizens of Sparks and a lifelong public servant of our entire State.

Your predecessor trustees made the decision to name Hug High School in 1968 for solid reasons that I will review below. That decision was sound in 1968 and even more so today. In addition, when that decision was made, the Board did not vote to name Hug High School for a while or until some future Board had a better idea. It was forever. Hug High is now an indelible part of the fabric of our community with distinguished alums and proud traditions. Should all those traditions be pushed aside as the High School moves down the road a few miles to a new home? I don't think so and hope you agree.

A half of a century is a long time, so it makes sense to consider why the Board made the decision that it did in 1968.

When the District Board of Trustees named our newest high school after Procter R. Hug, Sr. in 1968, it did so in recognition of and respect for the many selfless contributions made by Mr. Hug, Sr. to the State of Nevada, our northern Nevada community, and, most importantly, the school children of northern Nevada. Mr. Hug, Sr. spent nearly his entire life in Nevada, as a student, teacher, coach, school administrator, and state legislator.

Procter Hug spent his youth in Tonopah, Nevada, where he observed the life of a mining camp in the traditional boom-bust cycle and attended high school. His early fascination with sports in Tonopah, along with active participation on school teams, made it almost certain that he would become a college athlete. He chose to attend the

University of Nevada, where he attained fame as "Bunny" Hug, the football, basketball, and track star and coach.

Mr. Hug did not limit his college participation to sports, being active in student government and ultimately serving as student body president (an office, incidentally, that his son would also hold a few decades later).

After graduating from the university, Hug turned to coaching full-time at Sparks High School. He later became principal of the school and superintendent of Sparks district schools. In 1956, when the schools of the state reorganized into county-wide districts, Procter Hug was named assistant superintendent of Washoe County Schools. Ten years later, he retired as superintendent of Washoe County Schools.

Procter Hug's "retirement" was short lived. Within a few short months, he entered politics, running for, and being elected to, a seat in the state senate. There, Hug continued to be an outstanding spokesman for Nevada education. He worked constantly and successfully during the next two terms for educational improvements. When he retired from the legislature to enjoy well-earned leisure, he could assure his constituents of many constructive changes, including the beginnings of a year-round school calendar, improvements in methods of disposing of school property, and a state professional practices act governing educators.

While the School Board wisely named Hug High School for Procter R. Hug, Sr., it seems appropriate to also consider the legacy that Mr. left to our community. His son, the recently deceased Procter R. Hug, Jr., was a University regent and chair, deputy attorney general and Chief Judge of the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals. His grandson and great-grandson, who also bear his name, are distinguished attorneys in Reno.

Mr. Hug dedicated his entire life to public service, educating, mentoring, and leading the Nevada children who needed it the most. As a coach, teacher, and principal he was always concerned to bring along the troubled, disadvantaged student. Countless students have told Mr. Hug, Sr.'s family and friends over the years how Mr. Hug, Sr. helped them and changed their lives.

Mr. Hug understood what a great honor the School Board had bestowed on him and he took great pride in Hug High School, attending all the athletic events, graduations, and assemblies. He and his wife always appreciated the wonderful treatment afforded them by the student body and faculty at Hug High.

Procter Hug, Sr. was a humble servant leader. He was an individual of honor, integrity, wit and wisdom.

For all of these reasons, your predecessors wisely chose to honor a life of service by naming Procter R. Hug High School. I respectfully request that you honor both that decision and Mr. Hug by continuing his name on the school's successor facility.

Again, thank you for your service.

My name is Jerry H. Mowbray. I am a lifelong resident of Nevada and am writing regarding the new high school facility being constructed at Wildcreek, where Procter Hug High School is moving. I urge you to retain the name "Procter Hug High School" for the new Wildcreek high school facility.

When the District Board of Trustees named the exisiting high school after Procter R. Hug in 1968, it did so in recognition of and respect for the many selfless contributions he made to the State of Nevada, our northern Nevada community, and, most importantly, the children of northern Nevada. Mr. Hug spent nearly his entire life in Nevada, as a student, teacher, coach, school administrator, and state legislator. After growing up in Tonopah, Mr. Hug attended the University of Nevada in the 1920s, where he attained fame as "Bunny" Hug, the football (with "Rabbit" Bradshaw), basketball, and track star and coach. After graduating from the University, Mr. Hug turned to coaching and teaching at Sparks High School, later becoming principal of Sparks High, Superintendent of Sparks District Schools, and Assistant Superintendent of Washoe County Schools.

In 1966, Mr. Hug, determined to make an even bigger impact improving our State's education, so he ran for, and was elected to, the Nevada State Senate. During his legislative tenure, Senator Hug worked tirelessly and successfully for educational improvements. He was responsible for many constructive policies and processes in place today, including the year-round school calendar and our State's professional practices act governing educators.

In summary, Mr. Hug, dedicated his entire life to public service, educating, mentoring, and leading the Nevada children who needed it the most. As a coach, teacher, and principal he was always concerned to bring along the troubled, disadvantaged student. Mr. Hug took great pride in Hug High School, attending all the athletic events, graduations, and assemblies. He and his wife Beverly always appreciated the wonderful treatment afforded them by the student body and faculty at Hug High. Procter Hug was a man of honor, integrity, wit and wisdom.

I was a law clerk for Mr. Hug's son, Judge Procter Hug, Jr. I had many occasions to meet his father who is the name sake of Hug High School. I knew him to be a fine and honorable man. I went to his memorial service which was held at Hug High in 1991. Everyone who spoke of their memories of him painted a verbal picture not only of a true Nevadan but a superb educator as well.

The District on-line survey includes the names of several fine individuals more than worthy of the honor of a school namesake. As our community continues to grow, new District schools will be built and the Trustees will have the opportunity to carefully consider the appropriate names for these facilities when they come on line. Just as "Reno High School" moved in 1912 and again in 1951 and retained the name "Reno High School", when "Procter Hug High School" moves to the new Wildcreek facility, its name should remain "Procter Hug High School." The 1968 Washoe County School District Board of Trustees made an excellent decision; please respect that decision and continue Procter Hug, Sr.'s legacy for the next 50 years as well.


