

Supplies - \$15 Math fee (to purchase and replenish math supplies and manipulatives) Each time you come to Math class, you are expected to come prepared with the proper supplies. The items listed below are items we use every class. Please make sure you always have items. If you run out of a supply, make sure to tell your parents so they can restock your supplies when necessary.

***NOTE: Cell phone calculators will not be allowed in class. The district does not allow them to be used on tests and finals and students would have to suddenly do calculations by hand on tests. That can throw students off if they have been practicing the skill only with a calculator. Students will need to use the stand-alone <u>basic scientific calculator</u> that is listed below in the supply list.

Classroom Policies and Procedures

*Opening class procedure...

1.) Go directly to my assigned seat 2.) Take out any assignments or absent work and all materials needed for today's class and set on desk, 3.) Read the board and write down the assignments in my Panther planner, and 4.) Silently work on my Warm-up activity. (This is NOT a good time to conference with the teachers as they have designated requirements at the beginning of each period.)

*Passes...

The best time to use the restroom is during the 4-minute passing. If you do not think you will have time to use the restroom **and** get to class on-time, then go directly to the classroom and let your teacher know you need to use the restroom. That way the teacher knows why you came into the classroom after the bell. If you need to use the restroom during class, you will need to ask the teacher for a pass. **(3 passes per week)**

*Preparedness...

All students <u>MUST</u> come to class prepared to work. Items necessary for class: Positive attitude, pencils, erasers, extra lead, paper, binder, workbook, completed assignments, and resource materials. <u>Students</u> not prepared for class will receive a lowered Work Ethic grade for that period.

Note: Students will receive the first copy of the Go Math book at no cost. If students need an additional copy for any reason (loss, damage, etc.), there will be a charge of \$20 per book. This is an additional charge and is not included in the Math fee paid at the beginning of the year. Books can also be purchased on Amazon.

*Late/Missing work policy...

Deadlines are a very important Life Skill. It is imperative that students complete and submit ALL assignments on-time.

All assignments and the weekly agenda of required items to complete will be activated on Canvas the Friday prior to the week. Each assignment will have a specific due date. Assignments are to be uploaded, completed, or attached to the assignment on Canvas for credit. Make sure to press submit after you complete/upload the assignment. **No late work will be accepted**.

There will be a test or quiz every other week, possibly weekly. If a student is absent on the day of a test/quiz, he/she needs to get a pass from the teacher and come in at lunch with his/her lunch to make-up the test/quiz.

Students have as many days as they were absent plus one more day to complete make-up work and to make-up tests, no matter the reason for the absence (illness, Swope sport, vacation, etc.).

******Copied assignments will result in a 0% for both parties as well as a note in the grade book to inform parents/guardians and Administrators. Students should also not be copying answers from an online source (No Photomath!). If you are unsure of how to do something, put a question mark on the problem and ask for help the next day in class.

*Absence policy...

It is the student's responsibility to go to Canvas to get the missed assignments. If there is a separate handout, check Canvas to see if that handout has been uploaded. If the handout is not able to be uploaded, then come get it upon return from your absence. If you are unable to print at home, just look at the assignment/worksheet on your screen and do the assignment on a piece of paper.

*Checking Infinite Campus...

Students and parents are required to keep track of student grades by checking Infinite Campus at least once a week. If you do not have access to the Internet at home, students can use a computer on campus, at the local Washoe County libraries in town, or there is an app for their phone.

*Assignments...

Math assignments will be given credit for on-time completion. <u>Students **MUST** show work to receive credit.</u> Listed answers only **will not** be accepted. All papers/assignments should be labeled correctly and <u>all work</u> <u>shown</u> (credit will not be given to assignments that just have answers listed)...

ACADEMIC INTEGRITY POLICY

Cheating means gaining unfair advantage by using unauthorized information.

Cheating is further defined by but not limited to:

- **COPYING** someone else's homework, classwork, or test answers
- ALLOWING someone else to copy your work or test answers
- **USING** any kind of unauthorized device, study aid, or cheat sheet
- **POSSESSING** or **VIEWING** a copy of an exam beforehand
- SHARING test information with students who have not yet taken the test or course
 This includes taking answers/questions from a test out of the classroom without
 - the permission of the teacher. (even "by accident")
- CHANGING your answers or someone else's when correcting in class
- **MISREPRESENTING** work done by others as your own work

Plagiarism is presenting the words or ideas of another person <u>as one's</u> <u>own</u> without citing sources.

- <u>YOU ARE PLAGIARIZING</u> when you copy a phrase, a paragraph, a page or an entire paper.
- <u>YOU ARE PLAGIARIZING</u> when you copy from a published source, i.e. Internet or print.
- <u>YOU ARE PLAGIARIZING</u> when you copy from someone else's work.

Minimum consequences for cheating are as follows:

- **REFERRAL** to Student Services
- **PARENT CONTACT** by the teacher
- **LUNCH DETENTION** with Student Services
- **NOTATION** made in school discipline record

Additional consequences may include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Student will receive a ZERO on the test or homework assignment
- Student will receive an "F" in citizenship for the quarter and depending on the severity of the infraction, may receive an "F" in citizenship for the semester
- Alternative assignment, to be determined by the teacher
