

AFTER YOUR COVID-19 TEST

What Should I Do Now?



Wait for Results.

Please be patient. It may take up to 72 hours or longer to receive your test results. Results will be shared with designated leaders of your organization who will contact you directly with your test results.



Stay Home.

Please stay home until you receive your results. Isolate yourself from other household members, especially those with susceptible immune systems such as the elderly, pregnant women and children. If you have symptoms, stay home until they improve even if your test comes back negative.



Call a Doctor.

Before seeking medical care, please call **775-982-5000** and tell them you are being evaluated for COVID-19. A member of Renown's care team will direct you to the appropriate level of care.



Wash Your Hands.

Continue to wash hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If possible, use a separate bathroom from other members in your household.



Clean Surfaces.

Clean high-contact surfaces daily using an EPA-registered disinfectant.

What if I Test Positive?



Follow Instructions.

If you are contacted by the Washoe County Health District because you received a positive test result for COVID-19, follow the verbal instructions provided. You may be asked to participate in contact tracing to prevent spreading the illness.

Your personal information will not be shared with anyone outside the Washoe County Health District.



Remain at Home.

Remaining at home, isolating yourself from others and following good hygienic practices are the best prevention against COVID-19. Stay home from work and school until you are notified that you are no longer at risk of infecting others.

What if I Test Negative?



It is possible to test negative and later positive on a viral COVID-19 test. You may test negative if the sample was collected early in your infection and test positive later during the illness. You could also be exposed to COVID-19 after the test and get infected then. Even if you test negative, you still should take steps to protect yourself and others like wearing a mask, washing your hands, covering coughs and sneezes and avoiding close contact with others.
