- Application opens in early September of your senior year.
- Must have a **core weighted GPA of 3.0.**
- Required High School Classes:
  - English 4 years
  - Math 3 years (Alg 2 or higher)
  - Science 3 years
  - History 3 years

- Complete New Student Orientation, Advising and Registration (SOAR) – [orientation.tmcc.edu](https://orientation.tmcc.edu)
- Register and pay for classes
- **Complete The Promise Scholarship** – application available during the fall semester of your senior year. This scholarship makes attending TMCC for three years FREE. There are no academics requirements for this scholarship.

# ACT – February 25th

**Taking the ACT seriously may help you in several ways:**

- The scores may be used for admission if you are planning to attend a four-year college or university.
- A composite score of a 22 will give you automatic admission to UNR, if you do not meet the GPA requirement.
- A composite score of 21 will entitle you to the millennium scholarship, if you do not meet the GPA requirements.
- Test scores may be used for class placement at UNR and TMCC.
- **Having an ACT score (with writing) is a graduation requirement.**

# Millennium Scholarship

- \$10,000 Scholarship to be used at a Nevada Higher Education Institution over 6 years
- Eligibility
  - attend a Nevada High School for two years and graduate from a Nevada High School.
  - Graduate with a 3.25 GPA or a 21 composite on the ACT.
  - Earn Credits in the following areas
    - 4 credits of English
    - 4 credits of math (including Algebra 2)
    - 3 credits of science
    - 3 credits of social studies.
      - Aligns with the Advanced Diploma requirements
- Millennium is a passive scholarship – if you meet the requirements, you will get the scholarship. There is no application needed to do to earn the scholarship.

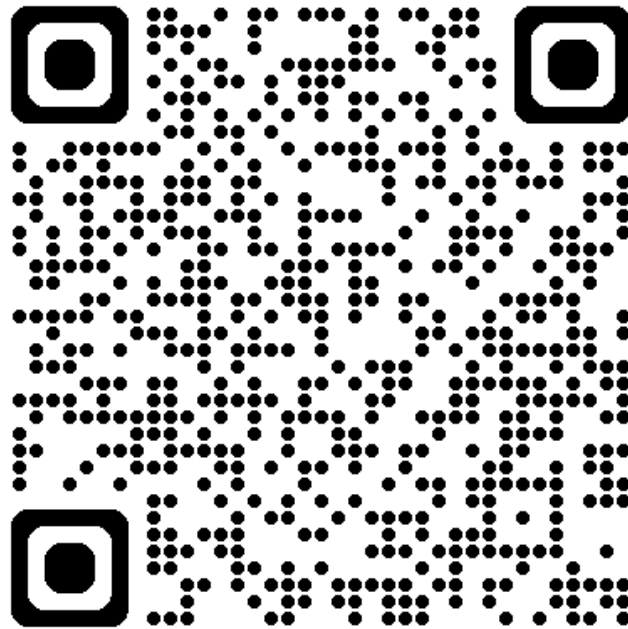
## Merit-Based Exemptions

**2227/2228 Algebra 2 – STEM (H) (Year)**

**Credit:** ½ credit per semester

**Fee:** None



➔ **Pre-Requisite:** Successful completion of Algebra 1 and Geometry or Formal Geometry with a B or better and/or teacher recommendation. Graphing calculators are required.

- Take time to read the course description

This is a one-year course, which strengthens and expands the techniques and concepts learned in Algebra 1. This course will strengthen the student's problem solving and algebraic skills in preparation for advanced mathematics courses. The major topics of study are: relations and functions; domain and range of parent functions; systems of nonlinear equations; polynomials and polynomial functions; complex numbers; quadratic equations; rational and radical functions, exponential and logarithmic functions; probability and statistics and the trigonometric functions with the use of the unit circle. Throughout the year, students will be expected to continue to develop the ability to reason and communicate mathematically, apply learned concepts to new problem-solving situations, and exhibit increased confidence in their ability to solve mathematical problems.

**Note:** Students may enroll in Algebra 2 and Geometry or Formal Geometry concurrently in order to take Calculus in high school.

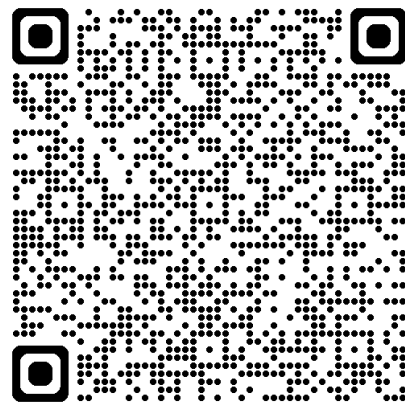

# Dual Credit

Dual Credit allows high school students to enroll in college courses at a discounted rate. Students/families are responsible for paying fees through the college and purchasing necessary books. Financial assistance may be available through the college but is not guaranteed.

- **Admission Criteria:**

- Students must meet all college set prerequisites
  - See TMCC/UNR course descriptions

- **Steps to Enroll:**

- Discuss plans with SSHS Counselor
- Apply as a Non-degree seeking student (if first time taking a dual credit course)
- Complete Permission to Enroll form or other required procedures

- **Fees:**

- TMCC: \$87.50/credit + additional fees – taken with TMCC Instructor
- UNR: \$154/credit + additional fees – taken with UNR Instructor
  - Fees subject to change, prices not guaranteed
  - *Most* college courses are 3 credits

*Dual Credit Classes may count towards a student's academic load or be taken for additional credits*

- Seniors can complete graduation requirements in December of senior year ~ what does this mean?
  - Do not have to attend school in the Spring semester of senior year
  - Cannot participate in Winter or Spring sport
  - Still able to participate in Senior Sunset, Prom, and Graduation (June)
  - Can begin college in the Spring (some scholarships may not be in place until Fall semester)
- Talk to your counselor about completing Early Graduation Application
